

See you all in Taranaki for conference number 65 in 2022!!




The Family programme



Forget the cost, focus on the benefit

NZGFA President, Graeme Martin is encouraging all groundspreaders not to fixate on the cost of Spreadmark certification but to consider the benefit instead. He tells the story of Wealleans' journey into Spreadmark accreditation and is honest when he says that it was a huge cost with, initially, very little evidence of any tangible or financial gain.

"For many companies, the cost of gaining Spreadmark accreditation could be perceived as simply too great to pursue," Graeme explains."We at Wealleans certainly had to have a discussion around this before we decided to go ahead, especially as we knew that the competitive advantage of being Spreadmark certified is currently limited. We know this because only a few of our customers have started to ask whether we are Spreadmark accredited; the Spreadmark conversation simply isn't going on out there that much...yet."

Despite this, and the fact that Wealleans already had in place it's own 'Quality Spread' programme comprising operator training, truck testing, health & safety, on-farm best practice and environmental regulations, the company decided to push on with creating a business plan for Spreadmark certification.

"The biggest thing for us was that as we continued to debate Spreadmark, it became increasingly clear that Spreadmark would, in the not too distant future, be the key to what happens next for the groundspreading industry.

Wealleans isn't the only company that is predicting that groundspreaders without Spreadmark accreditation will be marginalised in about five years time. It bases this on recent changes being implemented by government - including the new rules around nitrogen application, farm environment plans and the Healthy Waters legislation.

"We fully anticipate that regional councils will start to insist upon Spreadmark certification. Spreadmark already covers everything they want us to do. It is already a well-established and recognised industry standard. It makes sense that regional councils will harness Spreadmark and make it part of their own codes of compliance."

With that realisation, Wealleans decided that it didn't want to be one of

the companies who had to play catch up in the future. Instead, it wanted to be a front-runner and embrace the inevitable - allowing enough time to fully integrate Spreadmark across its business and embed it within the Wealleans work culture.

"The time and effort we spent on gaining Spreadmark accreditation was significant. We had piles of papers documenting our 'Quality Spread' programme and it was a challenge for us to integrate the work we have already done within the Spreadmark framework. In addition, we have a very large fleet and that took a fair bit of dedication to get every vehicle through."

Graeme says that Wealleans is now immensely proud that they took the leap into Spreadmark accreditation. "We changed our mindset. Instead of cost we saw investment. And in terms of benefit, we saw this as the right to continue operating. When you put Spreadmark in those terms, I don't believe you can argue against it. It is coming, so why not see Spreadmark as an opportunity to get organised, strengthen your businesses with robust, quality systems, invest in your people and, ultimately, grow your companies."

Spreadmark testing at Sollys

Towards the end of last year, we headed out to do some Spreadmark testing at Sollys Contracting in Takaka. The driver of the Scania is "Kelvin" and "Jarred" was behind the wheel of the Mercedes. The Scania was just new on the road, and is based in Collingwood where operator Kelvin lives. They mainly work in the area over the Takaka Hill but frequently travel over to the Motueka side when required.

A couple of years ago, when Merv Solly was considering putting on a new truck, he was in Australia and drove a Scania 500hp semi loaded to 89tonne at the Anglesea truck testing facility near Melbourne.

Merv was most impressed with the automatic transmission fitted in this truck, especially when taking off on a



quite steep slope, and the retardation when descending.

When he returned home he discussed with Scania the viability of this transmission being put in a 4wd spreader, as he believed the extra driveability, combined with the super comfortable cab should be a great combination and make for a great working environment.

This Auto is believed to be the first one in a Scania 4wd in NZ. Kelvin, who

has been operating Sollys spreaders for many years, was apprehensive re an auto at the start, but now is most happy with it and finds it a great asset to have.

This 410hp truck tested quite well over the trays, and is equipped with a very well finished bin from ERL in Ashburton.

Merv and Kelvin are more than happy with this truck, and the fuel economy of it.

Time to change the mindset

A recent hard-hitting presentation by NZGFA Health & Safety representative, Grant Anderson, carried with it a stark warning to all industry members that it's time to change the mindset around health and safety reporting.

At the NZGFA Conference in June, Grant said that, repeatedly, the receives regarding reports he accidents, incidents and near misses do not match what he is hearing on the ground. "This is a tight knit industry and information travels fast. I hear of so many accidents, incidents and near misses through the grapevine, yet these don't appear in any official reports. This is really concerning as it implies that we aren't taking incident reporting seriously enough."

Grant explained that every incident that causes you to catch your breath, even for a second, is worth reporting. "This means that near misses must not be ignored. While near misses are incidents that don't cause any harm, they could potentially have caused an injury or damage. Don't be tempted to brush off near miss incidents as 'nothing' just because no-one was

hurt. Sometimes, near misses involve 'very lucky escapes'."

According to Rob Thomson of Safe Business Solutions, the reasons why staff don't report near misses can be numerous.

"There might not be good processes in place to encourage easy and efficient incident reporting, or employees may be embarrassed and, if no harm has been done, may think it's quite alright to say nothing. There could also be a fear that if they've made a mistake, employees will be punished somehow. There could be peer pressure too, to not report an incident. Or, it could be that there's a lack of acknowledgment when staff do report an incident. If there's no thank you, feedback or follow-up, staff might be less inclined to say anything to management."

Rob adds that there could also be a work culture that, without realising it, promotes complacency. "Staff might be told unofficially by older or more senior peers 'don't worry about it', so they buy into the culture of not reporting incidents without question.

Employees might also avoid reporting near-misses or minor slips because they are embarrassed and don't want to be a laughing stock at smoko.

"If this is happening in your workplace, you need to change the culture to one which encourages employees to report any near-misses and use the information from incidents to review your risk assessments and control methods. By doing this, you could prevent accidents before they occur."



How to encourage **INCIDENT REPORTING**

- Employee participation is essential. This demonstrates that you, the employer, is invested in their safety, and will promote a positive safety culture.
- Motivate employees to contribute.
- Recognise contributions and reward participation rather than penalise or discipline staff for making a mistake.
- Collect data for performance management – identify success of your control measures and identify any that are failing.
- Communicate any findings and/or actions identified.
- Include both the individuals that reported the incident, accident or near miss, as well as any individuals that were involved or could have been affected by what occurred.
- Demonstrate to staff how the reporting of incidents can identify where safety controls are lacking or are ineffective.

Driving safely in adverse weather

New Zealand is renowned for its changeable weather which means you should plan and prepare before you find yourself on an icy, wet or snowbound road. Most of the time New Zealand has a temperate climate. However, storms can hit the country with little warning, delivering heavy rain, ice and snow, especially during the winter months (usually between July and August but often into September). This is the most hazardous time of year for driving, with frost and ice occurring throughout the country and snow in areas like the central North Island and across the South Island.

The following winter driving tips will help you stay safe on the road.

Preparation and Planning:

- Always check the weather forecast and road conditions before you leave.
- Think about where you're going and what route you should take – choose safety over convenience. If travel can't be put off, allow extra time for your journey.
- Plan to drive during daylight hours when visibility is better and hazards such as ice and snow are less likely. Avoid driving at night when hazards rapidly multiply.
- If travelling long distances, make sure you are well rested and plan where to have a break.
- Dress for the conditions, carry additional warm clothes and keep a survival kit in your vehicle in case you do get stuck.
- Ensure your vehicle is roadworthy and keep at least half a tank of fuel in case you get diverted onto another route or you are forced to turn back.
- Be prepared for snow and carry tyre chains that you know how to fit and use.

Spotting ice and snow:

Look out for shaded areas caused by high banks and tall trees where roads freeze and ice may not thaw during the day.

- Bridges could stay slippery longer than other road surfaces, so slow down when crossing.
- Frost is more severe at daybreak so be prepared for this after it becomes light. While it may not be frosty at 6am, it could be an hour or two later.
- Another way of detecting ice is to watch the other vehicles around you. If you spot them sliding, or you notice vehicles have veered off the road, you have probably driven into an icy area.
- If you find yourself in a situation that makes you nervous, pull over and either wait for the temperatures to rise or find an alternative mode of transport.
- It's always a good idea to carry a charged mobile phone with you so you can notify people if you've broken down.

Driving Tips:

When driving in icy conditions, you need to leave as much space as possible between you and the vehicle in front. In normal conditions follow the 2 second rule, but in wet, icy conditions double this reaction time to 4 seconds.

- If you do hit a patch of ice, and find yourself skidding, steer in the same direction as the rear of your vehicle is sliding.
- Never take your hands off the steering wheel and don't stamp your foot on the brake as this could cause your wheels to lock up. For vehicles without anti-skid braking systems, pump the brake pedal in short rapid bursts rather than pressing long and hard to avoid skidding or sliding.
- Avoid sudden braking or turning that could cause you to skid.

Accelerate smoothly and brake gently and use your highest gear when travelling uphill and your lowest gear when travelling downhill.

- As well as other drivers, there could be winter maintenance vehicles on the highway helping to keep the road open. If you come across any of these vehicles, stay a safe distance behind them and don't pass unless you're instructed to.
- When travelling in fog, rain or snow, drive with your lights dipped for increased safety, and if severely reduced, turn on front and rear fog lights (where fitted).

Vehicle Lights:

Seeing where you are going is a pretty vital part of driving, particularly in winter when visibility can be reduced even further by adverse weather conditions.

Problems with lighting contribute to around seven deaths and more than 80 injuries each year on New Zealand roads, according to the New Zealand Transport Authority (NZTA).

- While it may seem initially to be a simple case of "it's dark, turn on your lights", there are laws around how many lights your vehicle can have fitted and how and when you can actually use them.
- beam of light that is designed to penetrate the fog, lighting up the area directly in front of the vehicle, while also illuminating the sides of the road. They should only be used when visibility is "severely reduced" technically not just by fog, but also snow and heavy rain and it is against the law to use them during clear conditions during either day or night, due to the risk of dazzling other drivers.
- Broadly the same rules apply to rear fog lights, except for the fact that they must be red only.






Spring planning is well underway, with fertiliser stocks starting to hit our shores in earnest. We have fired
